

Summer Reading for Students Entering 7th Grade

We are excited you will be coming to Westminster in the fall! Students are required to complete a summer reading assignment, and you will find the information below. Reading can take you to new worlds. We hope you discover wonderful places this summer.

This summer, you are to read a total of 3 books:

- the required reading (Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry by Mildred Taylor)
- a book from the attached list
- a book of your choice (per your parents' approval).

<u>Please Note:</u> Any book read over the summer to complete the summer reading requirement counts for summer reading only, not for 7th and 8th grade AR or for 9th grade IR.

1. On the attached reading verification form, please list the title and author of the book you chose from the list and the title and author of the book of your choice. Parents **and** students should sign the form indicating that the student has read the 2 books listed in their entirety and that the student has not read the books before. This form is to be handed in on the **first day of school**.

2. On the <u>third day of school</u>, you will have a comprehension test on the required reading. You will be tested on the plot of the novel and on your understanding of the events in the novel. If you read the required book early in the summer, you will want to review before the test. You do <u>not</u> need a copy of the novel on test day.

3. On the <u>fourth day of school</u>, you will participate in a class "book chat" in which you will have the opportunity to share and discuss one of the additional books you read. The preparation needed for the book chat will be discussed with you in class. Having the book with you during the book chat will be helpful though it is not required.

*As stated above, having a copy of the required reading novel is not necessary on test/book chat day. Therefore, feel free to download books onto e-readers or even take advantage of audio books. Just keep in mind with audio books that students may need to review in order to prepare for the test and/or book chat.

Late Registering Students:

*Students registering after July 15 are responsible for the required book only.

7th Grade Summer Reading Book Chat Options for SY24-25

Word Play

Make a list of 15 new, unusual, or interesting words or phrases found in your book. For each of the 15 words/phrases, write 2 complete sentences. One sentence must explain the context (circumstances) of how or when your words/phrases are used. The second sentence should explain the reason for your choice. This assignment should have thirty sentences total, not including the 15 words/phrases you have chosen. For example, a sentence reading, "One word I have chosen is <u>dissipate</u>," does NOT count as a sentence.

Character Dive

Choose three characters from the story. For each character, write a paragraph and offer 3 reasons why you would or would not want to get to know him/her. Your reasons must refer to the book in some way. You may not submit a reason such as, "I think meeting a magician would be cool," or "It would be really interesting to spend time with the character." Be thoughtful in your explanations! Each paragraph should include a topic sentence and a conclusion sentence. **Each paragraph must contain a minimum of 6 sentences, but no more than 9 sentences.**

Comic Strip

Summarize the book by creating a comic strip. The comic strip must include 8-10 scenes/boxes; the scenes must be detailed (very little white space), and dialogue must be included in at least 6 of the boxes.

Your comic strip must follow the plot of the book:

-introduce main characters and setting, explaining the main problem faced by the main character(s)
-detail at least 3 main events
-highlight the climax

-include the resolution of the climax

You must email a picture of the comic strip to me as well as turn in the hard copy the day of your book chat. Make sure to put our name in the subject line of the email! The electronic and hard copy version of the comic strip must be the same.

Scrapbook (Non-Fiction books only)

After reading an informational book, make a scrapbook about the topics in the book. The scrapbook must contain 10 pages or items with a detailed explanation of each item (2 sentence minimum per item).

Use your best penmanship or type your sentences! Grammar matters. Points will be deducted for standard grammar errors (capitalization, punctuation at the end of sentences, etc.)
